1 Respective responsibilities of the auditor and the authority

Our responsibility as auditors to complete a **limited assurance review** is set out by the National Audit Office (NAO). A limited assurance review is **not a full statutory audit**, it does not constitute an audit carried out in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK & Ireland) and hence it **does not** provide the same level of assurance that such an audit would. The UK Government has determined that a lower level of assurance than that provided by a full statutory audit is appropriate for those local public bodies with the lowest levels of spending.

Under a limited assurance review, the auditor is responsible for reviewing Sections 1 and 2 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return in accordance with NAO Auditor Guidance Note 02 (AGN 02 as issued by the NAO on behalf of the Comptroller and Auditor General. AGN 02 is available from the NAO website – <https://www.nao.org.uk/code-audit-practice/guidance-and-information-for-auditors/> .

2 External auditor’s limited assurance opinion 2024/25

On the basis of our review of Sections 1 and 2 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return, in our opinion the information in Sections 1 and 2 of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return is in accordance with Proper Practices and no other matters have come to our attention giving cause for concern that relevant legislation and regulatory requirements have not been met.

As per the guidance provided in the Practitioners Guide, we recommend that the level of earmarked and general reserves is reviewed on a regular basis (typically at least annually and as part of the budget setting process)

A payment was made relating to the school crossing patrol service which was authorised under s137 of the Local Government Act 1972. Section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972 gives smaller authorities the ability to spend a limited amount of money for purposes for which they have no other specific statutory power. It allows smaller authorities to spend money on projects they believe will benefit some or all of their residents. In this case the payment could have been authorised under another statutory power S26 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, arrangements for patrolling school crossings.

Payments was made relating to Civic Events which were authorised under s137 of the Local Government Act 1972. Section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972 gives smaller authorities the ability to spend a limited amount of money for purposes for which they have no other specific statutory power. It allows smaller authorities to spend money on projects they believe will benefit some or all of their residents. In this case the payment could have been authorised under other statutory powers S111, S144, S145 of the Local Government Act 1972, facilitate a function, provide information, provide entertainment.
